Here's my presentation summary:

Bolon Island Sign: Instead of a semi-accurate biography of Jedediah Smith and his travel routes through the western US, we propose that the sign focus more on local history and native people in 1826-1828 with the top portion having an 1826 quote from McLeod on first contact with HBC and the bottom portion having an 1828 quote from Rogers and mentioning the SJ&S encounter and burials. This starts with a submission to the State Travel Information Council next week for their August 2 meeting. I've copied key JSS folks on this for critical review. Rogers, LaFramboise, and Starnoose need to be mentioned.

<u>Umpqua Memorial Stone</u>: This has been selected and moved into place by local people and businesses and is now ready for a bronze plaque to be manufactured and installed. If the Tribe would like to co-sponsor this project, then there is still time (2 or 3 weeks) to add their name to this monument. The nearby Bolon Island stone and plaque are still in good shape after 90 years!

October 28th Dedication: We will dedicate the stone monument on the 195th anniversary of the burial of 11 men that were killed near here on July 14, 1828. We are hoping to get a short prayer from a Methodist and a Catholic at the observation, and maybe a hymn sung at sunset. The 200th anniversary will be in five years and we will want to be thinking ahead to that. The more Tribal involvement in these observations, the better. There is true international significance to this history.

<u>Umpqua Memorial Interpretive Sign</u>: This sign is County, not State, so there is far more leeway to content and design. Current plans are for historical accounts by Rogers (July 12-13, 1828), McLoughlin (August 10, 1828), McLeod (October 28, 1828), and Gordon (November 13, 1857) be featured, and a listing and short bio for each of the 14 men known to have died there.

If the Confederated Tribes are interested in being co-sponsors of the Memorial Stone, then remaining costs are for the bronze plaque (estimated \$800) and engraving (unknown cost), with installation being donated by Pacific Memorials. A final measurement of the mounting surface needs to be made on-site, with minimum sise being at least 9" x 12" for the plaque.

If possible, we would also like to have the Interpretive Sign completed by the October 28 Dedication -- the application is already in place, but design, construction, installation, and funding need to be completed first. In that regard, we have contacted Douglas County Historical Society for potential collaboration and sponsorship.


